

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. 

All chn given access to a broader curriculum offer through Forest School and as result, chn enhanced leadership skills, problem solving skills, resilience and chn were physically active, whatever the weather.

Extra-curricular physical activities provided (2 per term for different age groups) and attended by on average, 10 chn per session.

Swimming lessons (suspended due to COVID) would have been provided for those who had not vet reached expectations: Y6 – 36% (4/7) were able to swim 25m by the end of the year.

Pupil voice shows that some children are reluctant to take part in traditional range of sporting activities therefore, expand the range of sports offered during the school day.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

Club attendance 2019-2020 shows that often the same children attend physically active clubs whilst some do not attend a physically active club but do attend other clubs therefore expand the range of extra-curricular sports and gather pupil/parent voice in order to target children's interests.
